

LONE WORKER POLICY

Employees have the responsibility to take reasonable care of themselves and other people affected by their work activities. Lone workers and their supervisors are responsible for setting up and maintaining adequate communication arrangements prior to commencing work that could be considered routine operational tasks while working alone.

Onboard AGS vessels communication arrangements must be in place before any lone worker tasks proceed. Precautions should take into account normal work and foreseeable emergencies. There are certain situations onboard vessels, for varying reasons, where crew members could be required to work alone. These tasks may include bridge or engine room watches, fire patrols at night, cable repair, inspections on node deployment and gun decks, workshop activities, etc.

All crew members shall ensure their respective Line Manager is informed of their intent to work alone. Line Managers and the employee can then establish a schedule for checking in via radio, CCTV or visual checks.

It is the Master or Project Manager's decision to determine the level of supervision for work onboard their vessel. The applicable procedures must be in place to monitor lone workers to help keep them from undue harm.
